LET CELEBRATIONS COMMENCE

A day filled with remembrance, music, pageant and celebration, honoured the 400th anniversary of the Trades House of Glasgow on Sunday 6 February 2005. Sharing both the significant founding day and the celebrations were Glasgow City Council and the Merchants House.



Glasgow Cathedral proved the magnificent setting for the Civic Service of Thanksgiving and Dedication conducted by the Very Reverend Dr William J Morris, Minister of the Cathedral, along with the Most Reverend Mario Conti, Archbishop of Glasgow, and the Right Reverend Dr Idris Jones, Bishop of Glasgow and Galloway.

The Service marked four centuries in the lives of the two Houses, which have been so intertwined in the history and development of the City of Glasgow. Professor John Wallace, Principal of the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama, created a Fanfare for Glasgow, which was performed as the procession made its way into the Cathedral.

During lunch in the Lower Church following the Service, Merchants House Lord Dean of Guild Andrew Primrose and Trades House Deacon Convener Tom Gilchrist presented Dr Morris with a framed copy of the Order of Service.

The Glasgow Royal Concert Hall resonated to the sounds of the Royal Scottish National Orchestra as the Trades House of Glasgow presented this unique 400th anniversary gala concert to the City.

Proceeds will go towards the fund for the Teenage Cancer Trust and The

Prostate Cancer Charity for Glasgow.

Pianist Martin Jones, mezzo-soprano Jane Irwin and the Scottish Power Pipe Band joined the RSNO and conductor James Lowe for an unforgettable evening. Compere for the evening was Blythe Duff, well known for her role in Taggart.

The Deacon Convener, accompanied by his Platform, led a procession of the Incorporated Trades complete with flags and chains of office onto the stage (pictured above) as the RSNO was joined by the Scottish Power Pipe Band for a rousing finale.

Commenting on the event, Tom Gilchrist said: "This unique concert, with Lord Provost Liz Cameron and Lord Dean of Guild Andrew Primrose among our distinguished guests, was outstanding. Everyone there seemed to share my pride in our City as we celebrated such an historic date in Glasgow's calendar."

CITY BENCHMARK

A commemorative sculpture has been commissioned for the Merchant City area of Glasgow to mark the 400th anniversary of the founding of the Merchants House and the Trades House, working together with the City Council to help make Glasgow flourish.

The three organisations, who are jointly funding the sculpture, established the brief, inviting five artists to submit proposals for a piece of public art within this area of regeneration. Following great deliberation by the assessors, Doug Cocker has been commissioned to complete the sculpture before the end of June this year.

The panel of assessors included Bailie Gordon Matheson representing the City, the Lord Dean of Guild Andrew Primrose and Deacon Convener Tom Gilchrist. They were guided by expert technical assessors Sandra Gunn, Assistant Principal at Glasgow Metropolitan College, Professor Alison Yarrington, Professor of History of Art at the University of Glasgow and Dr Bruno del'Priope, an international expert in artworks for the public realm, under the chairmanship of David Harding OBE.

Situated in Hutcheson Street on the axis of Garth Street opposite the Trades Hall, the sculpture will be outside the door of the former Merchants House office at the Sheriff Court and close to the City Chambers.



INTERNATIONALLY ACCLAIMED PROFESSOR TO DELIVER LECTURE

Professor Thomas Devine OBE, the internationally acclaimed Professor of Irish and Scottish Studies at Aberdeen University, is to deliver this year's Trades House Lecture at Strathclyde University on Tuesday 31 May.

Professor Devine is one of the UK's most prominent and distinguished practitioners of Irish and Scottish economic and social history.

He was educated at Strathclyde University where he graduated with first class honours in History in 1968 followed by a PhD and D.Litt. He rose through the academic ranks from assistant lecturer to Reader, Professor, Head of Department, Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences and finally Vice-Principal of the University in 1992.

In 1998 he accepted the Directorship of the world's first centre of advanced research in Irish and Scottish Studies in Aberdeen.

Professor Devine is the author or editor of books on such varied topics as emigration, famine, Scottish transatlantic commercial links, urban history, the Scottish Highlands and rural social history.

His major book, The Scottish Nation, became an international best seller and for a time, even outsold the adventures of Harry Potter in Scotland. His widely acclaimed volume, Scotland's Empire 1600-1815, formed the basis for a major six-part BBC2 series.

The subject of Professor Devine's lecture will be announced in March, when details will be available from the Trades House Administration Centre.

DEACON CONVENER'S DINNER

First class toasts and replies topped this Civic Dinner for the shakers and movers in Glasgow. Proposing the Toast to the City of Glasgow was well-known journalist, author, broadcaster and ambassador for all things Scottish, Jack Webster. Reply came courtesy of Glasgow City Council Chief Executive, George Black.

Toast to the Trades House was proposed by Lord Kerr of Kinlochard, who spent 37 years in the diplomatic service, more recently serving as Permanent Undersecretary at the Foreign Office and then Secretary General of the European Convention. Deacon Robert Steele of the Incorporation of Cordiners made the reply.

A successful annual Ladies Dinner was held on the same evening in the Western Club.

CHARITY LAW - ARE YOU KEEPING UP?

Significant changes in charity law are in progress. As many members of the Trades House are involved in charities in a voluntary capacity, often on the Board of Trustees, it is essential that we keep ourselves up to date. This article by Gillian Donald, partner in Scott-Moncrieff and a specialist in charity accounting and governance, tells us more.

The Charities and Trustee Investments (Scotland) Bill was presented for first stage debate in the Scottish Parliament in November 2004. We expect to have 13 sets of additional requirements issued in the form of Regulations, most notably those regarding accounting and auditing. These have been delayed and are now due out early in 2005.

The Bill sets up a statutory charity regulator. Its function will be to maintain a public record of charities, facilitate compliance with the Bill and investigate apparent misconduct. The current regulator, the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR), has been in existence for a year in its current form as a department of the Scottish Executive but its new form will be that of a non-ministerial department.

Under the new rules, charity trustees will • obtain and consider "proper advice" be required to:

- act in the interests of the charity
- seek, in good faith, to ensure that the charity exercises its functions in a manner, which is consistent with its purposes
- act with the care and diligence that it is reasonable to expect of a person who is managing the affairs of another person, and
- where exercising functions as a charity trustee in the course of a business or profession, use any special knowledge and expertise that it is reasonable to expect of a person acting in the course of that business or profession

For those responsible for managing investments in accordance with the Trustees' Investment Act 1961, there is good news. The permitted investment categories have been extended. The downside is that duties have increased for charity trustees in respect of investments. They are now required to:

- have regard to the suitability to the trust of the proposed investment and the need for diversification of investments.
- about initial investment and

subsequent changes in the investment unless having considered the circumstances they do not consider it necessary or appropriate to take such advice.

Many charities are not incorporated. Either they do not think it appropriate or perhaps they have not considered it! If you are a trustee of an unincorporated charity you may be concerned about personal liability for the charity debts.

Good news comes in the form of the new Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation. The implementation date for this is not vet known but it will offer a form of organisation, which gives limited liability and imposes charity rules rather than company rules. Conversion, we hope, will be simple and efficient.

The legislation timetable that aimed to have Royal Assent by June 2005 now looks unlikely due to delays in producing the Regulations. We could reasonably expect to have the detail of Regulations throughout the course of this year with implementation due next year. These will be highlighted in later editions of the Craftsman

A CRAFTSMAN TRIBUTE

Bob Colquhoun, an enthusiastic member of the Incorporation of Fleshers and public relations consultant to the Trades House, has died at the age of 62 following a year of poor health. Amongst his many contributions to the Trades House was the production of *the Craftsman*, which he established and launched in the early 1990s.

A former head of marketing and PR with Glasgow City Council, Bob enjoyed a distinguished career of more than 40 years. Before embarking on the world of PR, he served as a reporter, feature writer and sub-editor on local and national newspapers including the Paisley Daily Express, Daily Mail and the then Glasgow Herald.

Following nine years as a journalist, Bob



became information manager for whisky company Wm Grant & Sons, where he handled UK and international media relations and set up Scotland's first major visitor centre at the Glenfiddich distillery. He spent 11 years as managing director of Rex Stewart PR, which he built into one of Scotland's top three agencies.

Latterly he moved to the Isle of Bute with his wife, Arline, who died three years ago. From his home in Rothesay, he continued his PR work as an independent consultant.

Bob will be sadly missed but fondly remembered by many as a meticulous and cheerful practitioner who was passionate about his work with the Trades House.

CRAFT NEWS

A new book written by Craig Mair charts the history of The Incorporation of Coopers, shedding light and colour on the origins, life and work of this very ancient Craft in Glasgow.

Craig explored the annals of the Mitchell Library, as well as the Cooper's own archives, in his meticulous research for the book. He also visited the Taylor family's Speyside cooperage at Craigellachie, which claims to have the only cooperage

visitor centre in Britain.

The result is a book, which is a thoroughly enjoyable and enlightening read, also packed with photographs from throughout the past century up until recent years.

CALLUM SCOOPS WOODEN SPOON



QUEEN PERMITS CORDINERS TO ADMIT WOMEN

Her Majesty The Queen has permitted The Incorporation of Cordiners to change its Rules to admit women members. At a meeting of the Privy Council, the Queen granted a Supplementary Charter to the Cordiners to end the centuriesold restriction under which only men could join the Craft.

A Royal Charter granted by George V in 1919 currently constitutes the Cordiners, and provides that members be male. After consultation with the membership, a motion to allow women members, promoted by the Master Court, was passed unanimously.

In consultation with the Privy Council Office in London, the Master Court then prepared a formal Petition to the Queen requesting a Supplementary Charter. After a number of formalities this was granted at a Privy Council meeting held just before Christmas.

The Charter has now been transmitted to the Scottish Executive Protocol Department, which will deal with the next stage of the procedure with the production of the Supplementary Charter document, to which the Great Seal of Scotland will be adhibited.
