The renovation of the Hall is continuing apace with Phase III now commencing with completion in September and the changes will be dramatic. Finally, may I take this opportunity of thanking everyone for helping so greatly in my year as Deacon Convener. The feelings of excitement, sadness, humbleness and satisfaction have all made it such that I will never forget the honour and privilege. I greatly look forward to the remainder of my term in office.

YOUR SUPPORT CAN RESTORE HALL'S FORMER GLORY

Work is well on hand with the refurbishment of the Trades Hall. New opportunities have arisen to further enhance this magnificent building and restore its external appearance nearer to the original 18th century Robert Adam design.

This will only be possible with the support of individual craftsmen.

Phase I (refurbishment of entrance hall and basement cloakrooms) and Phase II of the work (repairs to the roof areas and the dome) have now been completed and it is intended to commence the next phase in April. This work will not only encompass the infill of both lightwells and the refurbishment of the kitchen but the ground floor cloakroom and reception area. Additionally, the ground floor reception room will be renovated and redecorated in a handsome Adamising manner. This pleasing scheme has been highly commended by the Renovation Committee for its fidelity to Eighteenth Century aesthetics. Tenders for all this work are being collated by the Architects. Completion is planned by September.

As work has proceeded new opportunities have arisen to provide better servicing, including a new heating system and lift, and more convenient arrangements and the Trustees intend to take full advantage of these. To ensure that there are sufficient funds to do this we will need to give them further help.

"We would like to see the target increased to enable the additional work to be undertaken - the total sum involved will be about £1.5 million and it is our urgent hope that we, the individual craftsmen whose ancestors created the Hall and gave it into public trust, can raise a substantial part of this additional funding ourselves," said lan Macpherson, Chairman of the Refurbishment Committee.

Very generous grants have already been made by a number of incorporated trades, public authorities, trusts and individuals, so that over £1.1 million has now been accounted for out of the original target of £1.25 million. The Trustees hope to record the names of all donors in a suitable and public way at the Trades Hall and compilation of the initial list is already under way.

FINANCIERS URGED TO SUPPORT NEW INDUSTRY

The financial community in Glasgow has been urged by Lord Provost Robert Innes to help increase employment in the city by supporting new manufacturing ventures.

Replying to the Toast to the City of Glasgow at the Annual Deacon Convener's dinner in Trades Hall, the Lord Provost said:

"Over the past year, Trades House has highlighted the need for Glasgow to increase its manufacturing base and provide more job opportunities and incentives for young people to take up a career in manufacturing.

"Statutory bodies can play their part in creating the city environment, providing assistance with premises and support and advice services but if the budding manufacturing entrepreneurs of today are to be successful then the financial community must also be prepared to recognise and support their potential to take them forward into the next century."



REACHING OUT TO FRIENDS OF TRADES HOUSE

Following a very successful combined Contact/Trades House afternoon tea last summer, the seed was sown for Lindsay Gillespie, the Late Deacon of the Incorporation of Wrights, and his wife Agnes to develop a new idea. Christmas dinner for the men and women veterans at Erskine Hospital has made all the better thanks to the support of Trades House. Over £2,000




was provided from House funds to ensure that the dinner went with a swing. The staff at Erskine are to be congratulated on the dedication and care that they show not only at Christmas but all year round.
