THE CHALLENGE TO BUSINESS **HUMAN RIGHTS:**

Scottish business was challenged by Mary Robinson to play a greater role in combating global human rights abuses as she delivered the annual Trades House Lecture at Glasgow Caledonian University in July. The former President of Ireland and United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights - now executive director of the Ethical Globalisation Initiative — was introduced to the audience of business leaders and staff from Glasgow's three universities by Deacon Convener Ian

She emphasised the need for Scottish businesses to take the lead in tackling negative attitudes towards immigrants and to use their skills for the benefit of their com-

panies and the Scottish economy.
"It is important to recall that thanks in large part to the creativity and energy of the private sector, we live in an age of incredible human and financial resources, technology and know how," said Mrs Robinson. "Yet at the same time, the world remains a place of unspeakable poverty, repression and injustice for many millions of

people. "Global business has become so dominant in world affairs that it must be called on to step in and take responsibility where governments have either failed or have been unable to act. The primary responsibility for protecting human rights must remain with national governments. However governments have shrunk. Privatisation means companies are now taking on more of the work governments used to do, and that must come with responsibility.

Following the lecture Mrs Robinson joined Trades House representatives for dinner at the Trades Hall.

CALLING ALL MEMBERS

With links to Malawi going back to the days of Scottish missionary, David Livingstone, it makes perfect sense that the people of Scotland are being called on to help raise much needed funds to tackle the plight of this African nation.

Funds are being sought for the Scotland/Malawi Partnership, which arose out of the wish of Strathclyde University and Bell College to see continued support to Malawians as they face famine and continuing health problems, particularly HIV/Aids, TB and Malaria - David Livingstone came from Blantyre and was a student at the John Anderson College, now Strathclyde University. Their joint endeavours were first initiated through their Malawi Millennium Project.

The Lord Provosts of Glasgow and Edinburgh have become patrons of the partnership. They are united in its aim to raise awareness of the need for sustainable building, while undertaking special projects to break the poverty cycle, provide famine relief and generally improve the quality of Malawian life.

Now the Trades House is calling upon its members to help by donating to this worthwhile cause and by spreading the word about the plight of the Malawians. Few have contributed as much to the exploration of Africa as the gentle Livingstone, who spent 30 years in the 1800s and ended his life exploring almost a third of the African continent, opening its heart to missions. The generosity and compassion of Scots today can serve his memory well.

THE FORGOTTEN HERO

A former Deacon Convener of the Trades House, who was regarded as one of the most important men in Victorian Glasgow, has been honoured after 150 years. Since his death in 1854 Archibald McLellan had lain largely forgotten in an unmarked grave in the city's Necropolis. McLellan was twice elected Deacon Convener to the Trades House and was the youngest ever at the age of 25.

A prominent city businessman, McLellan became a magistrate at the age of 25, and was a councillor for more than 30 years. He was a successful coachbuilder but after a period of overtrading was declared bankrupt and died alone, without family at the age of 58.

Paying tribute, Deacon Convenor Ian Elliot said: "The

Trades House is exceptionally grateful to the ladies for bringing this oversight to light and then having the tenacity to raise funds to put it right. Archibald McLellan was one of the great men of the city and one of the founders of modern Glasgow."




WE ARE SAILING

The Hammermen are supporting Strathclyde University's Formula Student team, which was top Scottish entry and placed 6th in the 21 Class 1 British Teams in international competition this year. The team are to receive £1,000 per annum over a three-year period from the Hammermen.

annum over a three-year period from the Hammermen. Based in the Engineering Faculty and started in Mechanical Engineering, the team now includes Electrical and Electronic Engineering, Design Manufacture and Engineering Management and Marketing students. The Formula Student competition attracted 67 teams from universities across Europe, North America, Australia and India this year. The objective is to design, build, cost and race a small single-seater racing car and convince a panel of judges that a cost effective prototype has been built and is worth putting into production.

As well as a sales presentation, students have to perform an acceleration trial over 75 metres - Strathclyde's car can get to 60 mph in 3 seconds! - a manoeuvrability test and an endurance and economy 22k run on a racing circuit where they compete against the clock, not each other. The car needs to be redesigned and built from

scratch every two years.

"The whole exercise is an excellent learning experience in many ways," said Clerk of the Hammermen Alistair Burrow. "They have to apply their learning not only in the practical aspects of design and build, but also through leadership and management skills, problem solving, initiative and creativity. On top of this, there are the organizational requirements of a 40-plus team, project planning delivery and presentation skills in seeking sponsorning, delivery and presentation skills in seeking sponsorship support, as well as at the competition itself. My Master Court is most impressed at the quality of this team of students.

In the international competition, the Strathclyde team were also in the top 20 in the design and sales categories, plus a magnificent 4th in the costing event. Altogether an excellent performance.




