



ROYAL RECOGNITION FOR RAPID RESPONSE

Funded by the Trades House, the first rapid response vehicle for the Ambulance Service in Glasgow made an impressive debut as part of The Queen's Golden Jubilee celebrations when HM Queen Elizabeth and HRH the Prince Philip visited the city in May.

The day started with a Service of Thanksgiving at Glasgow Cathedral, attended in his capacity as the city's third citizen by Deacon Convener George Horspool accompanied by his wife Charlotte.

Later in the day the Queen and Prince Philip

toured an exhibition representative of the work of charitable and voluntary organisations in the city. The Duke of Edinburgh was interested in particular in the work of the Trades House and the Incorporated Trades as he became a member of the Incorporation of Hammermen of Glasgow in 1955.

On the impressive Trades House stand Prince Philip inspected the Scottish Ambulance Service's first rapid response vehicle to be based in the city and had its life-saving role explained to him by paramedic Stephen

Corbett. Also on hand to outline the many charitable and educational activities of the House were Collector Ian Elliott, Late Collector Stewart Wright, Clerk Gordon Wyllie and Deacon James Morrison and Preses Norman Fyfe, both members of the "chain gang" fund-raising committee.

The vehicle was funded from the proceeds of the House's Glasgow Ball, held in the Hilton Hotel on 11 May, and other fund-raising events.

THE GOLDEN BOOK

Deacon Convener George Horspool gets down to some serious reading as he examines the entry which has won the Gold Medal in the Trades House's Glasgow CollegeSkills competition for the best item of craftwork produced in the past year by a student at a Glasgow college.

With the Deacon Convener is Barry Anderson whose entry of a leather bound book was judged to be the best exhibit from over 700 entries in 20 categories from nine Glasgow colleges by Linda Ammon, the London-based Chief Executive of UK SKILLS.

Barry (42), who lives outside Carlisle, has had a varied career working in a library and as a chef as well as running his own company, Anderson Tarpaulins, before deciding to take a Higher National Certificate course in fine book binding and book repair at the Glasgow College of Building and Printing. This he has done as he feels that there is a gap in the market for him to set up his own small binding and repair company in Carlisle as currently, he says, most books in the city have to be sent some 200 miles for binding or repair. "BEACON OF LIGHT" IS WINNER

The House's annual Millennium Award, in association with Glasgow City Council, has gone to Halgreen Nursery School in Drumchapel. The award, instituted in 2000, recognises the efforts of the school which has achieved the most in the past year by working together with the local community for their mutual benefit.

The award was made in the presence of staff, children, parents and community representatives at Halgreen Nursery School by Deacon Convener George Horspool.

The Millennium Award co-ordinator, Ian MacConnacher, commented: "Halgreen has inspired so much assistance from local busi-

nesses, schools, colleges, artistic groups and parents that this award is being made not so much for the school but the whole community of Drumchapel. This is illustrated in the key note of the school's submission which states 'BECAUSE OF THE HIGH NUMBER OF LOCAL ADULTS AND TEENAGERS INVOLVED IN THE WORK, NO VANDALISM HAS OCCURRED AND THE SCHOOL IS NOW GREATLY IMPROVED AND A BEACON OF LIGHT IN AN OTHERWISE UNATTRACTIVE LOCATION'."

Certificates of merit were also awarded to Annette Street Primary School, Victoria Primary School, Hampden School and Whitehill Secondary School.



Sir Ian took as the theme for his address "The Economic Climate in Scotland: Skills for Tomorrow's Jobs" and quoting from the song "Scotland the Brave" he highlighted the description "Land of the High Endeavour" which he believed was a view of itself that Scotland would be happy to espouse. But he said it would take bravery on the part of Scotland to accept the changes necessary if Scotland's ambitions are to be realised.

He told the audience: "We at Scottish Enterprise have ambitions for Scotland and are ambitious for Scotland, but it is not a blind ambition. It is underpinned by a clear and realistic vision of Scotland as home to one of the most skilled and adaptable workforces in the world."




